As we close this year of Prospect's 50th birthday, I am writing to provide brief updates on matters of interest in Prospect. Writing these updates reminded me of how fortunate Liza and I are to live in such a special place. Swearing in of Council members and Current Art Exhibition. Please join us at City Hall at 11 a.m. on New Year's

Day when the members of Prospect's City Council will take the oath of office. Your visit to City Hall will also give you the opportunity to view our current art exhibition -- Clay Painting & Photography. They served the city with distinction and good humor. I also thank the four returning members of the city council -- Don Gibson, David Holmes, John Clark, and former mayor John Evans.

A new pedestrian stream crossing bridge is visible from the lot and is a short walk away. The bridge provides an attractive and functional connection between the west and east ends of the park. A little further down the walk is the canoe and kayak launch which provides easy access to Harrods Creek.



Art in City Hall Prospect is pleased to announce that Lee Pennington, poet, film maker, and author will be presenting at the closing exhibition of "Clay, Painting and Photography" at Prospect's City Hall on Sunday, January 5, 2025 from 2 to 3 pm.

Pennington, the 1984 Kentucky Poet Laureate, has published over 1300 poems in more than 300 magazines in America and abroad. He has had nine plays produced, wrote the script for the Moonshine War (MGM 1970) starring Alan Alda, Richard Widmark, etc., and has authored twenty one books. He holds two Honorary Doctoral degrees: Doctor of Literature from World University and Doctor of Philosophy in Arts from the Academy of Southern Arts and Letters. Pennington taught for nearly 40 years, the last 32 as Professor of English and Creative writing at the University of Kentucky Jefferson Community College until he retired in 1999.

Prospect Parks—What a Year! And More to Come...

2024 was a banner year for Prospect Parks. There was at least one Parks & Recreation Committee-sponsored event each month. In January, children made pinecone bird feeders, and a lecture was presented on Bluegrass Geology. February continued the lecture series with a program on Amphibians in Kentucky. March and April offered wildflower walks and bird watching tours. April featured an Adopt-a-Highway cleanup event through Prospect along US 42, and also

marked the return of Shakespeare in the Parks at the John E. Evans Pavilion with a production of "A Midsummer Night's Dream". From May through September there were monthly concerts in the Pavilion, which were enjoyed by all. In June, the first annual Kidz Fest took place with music and activities geared towards our younger citizens. July featured a Kid's Nature Walk. Parks Committee members participated in the planning and execution of the Prospect

50th Birthday Party held in October, a wonderful time of celebration for our city. In November, an "Art for All" event encouraged residents of all ages to

decorate a snowflake/wreath made from recycled materials. November also marked the return of the Harrods Creek Trail Bash after a one-year hiatus. 70 runners participated in the popular 5K and 10K trail run, and all partici-

pants—runners and volunteers had a great time. In 2024 enhancements to our park infrastructure included the installation of the much anticipated and beautiful Harrods Creek Park Stream Crossing Bridge, the re-build of the bench swing on the Blue Trail in Harrods Creek Park (which was damaged in one of the summer storms), and the installation of new trail signage in Putney Pond & Woodlands. Speaking of storms, after

major weather events, our Prospect Public Works Department worked hard to clear fallen trees blocking trails so that our community members could hike in the parks

Scouts continue to contribute to our parks through Eagle projects. This year, two information kiosks were completed in Little Hunting Creek Park: one near Charlotte's Playground adjacent to City Hall; and another at the trail head near Fox Harbor Drive.

In addition to these activities, Parks Committee members assisted with the July 4th City Celebration, the Forestation Board's Arborfest, and the Chamber of Commerce's "Touch the Trucks" event.

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The Bradford Pear Challenge

Prospect is proud to be recognized as a Tree City USA by the National Arbor Day Foundation. Trees provide many positive attributes for the community, but some trees also present problems. This is to create awareness of issues with Bradford Pear trees.

Once upon a time after their market introduction in 1961, Bradford Pear trees were the darlings of the tree world. They were used extensively in yards and to line streets in neighborhoods. Initially, the trees offered lovely form and beautiful (albeit less than pleasant odor) spring blooms. Time has taught us that this species has many issues that present potential problems, such as a tight branch structure that makes them prone to storm damage.




Trees, like people, do have a life span. Bradford Pears have a short to moderate life span. They may continue to leaf out, but it is likely that their internal structure is deteriorating and may show signs if the trunk is examined. Once thought to be sterile, they can also be invasive. Birds ingest viable seeds and spread them in their waste, creating tree populations that out-compete with native plants. Who needs more problem trees?

Several states have outlawed Bradford Pears, and at least one other is offering rewards for their removal. Bradford Pears have been on Prospect's "do not plant" list for many years, and also considered officially invasive by Kentucky. The challenge is the risk they present to property and people, potentially unexpected. Hazard trees do not have to be totally dead and may not present an obvious risk, but any mature pear tree should be considered for professional evaluation and potential removal.

Losing an established tree is never easy, but Prospect does offer assistance with new trees. Seventy five 3 gallon trees of various species were given to residents at the annual Arborfest in October. There is also the newer Canopy Tree program with a shared investment with residents that offers larger trees in both the spring and fall.

Prospect's Herb Shulhafer Recognized by Kentucky Chapter of the American Institute of Architects

Earlier this month, the Kentucky Chapter of the American Institute of Architects presented its Citizen Architect Award to Hunting Creek resident Herb Shulhafer. The AIA recognized Herb's "extraordinary contributions to the Jefferson County community" and noted his commitment to public service and the betterment of society. The AIA cited Herb's work in Prospect as the project manager for the construction of the pavilion and playground in Little Hunting Creek Park and the pedestrian bridge in Harrods Creek Park.

Herb retired in 2016 following a notable career in architecture earning the status of an Emeritus Architect in Kentucky. In addition to his community work in Prospect, Herb serves on the boards of the Veritas continuing education program at Bellarmine University and of the Friends of the Farnsley-Kaufman House. Herb is a leader in the ongoing preservation and restoration of the 220 year old Farnsley-Kaufman House. Through his membership in the Prospect-Goshen Rotary Club, Herb volunteers to help tend the Woodland Garden at Creasy Mahan Nature Preserve.

Herb is one of many volunteers who make our city a great place to live. We thank him for his service and applaud him for his well-deserved recognition by the AIA.


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
